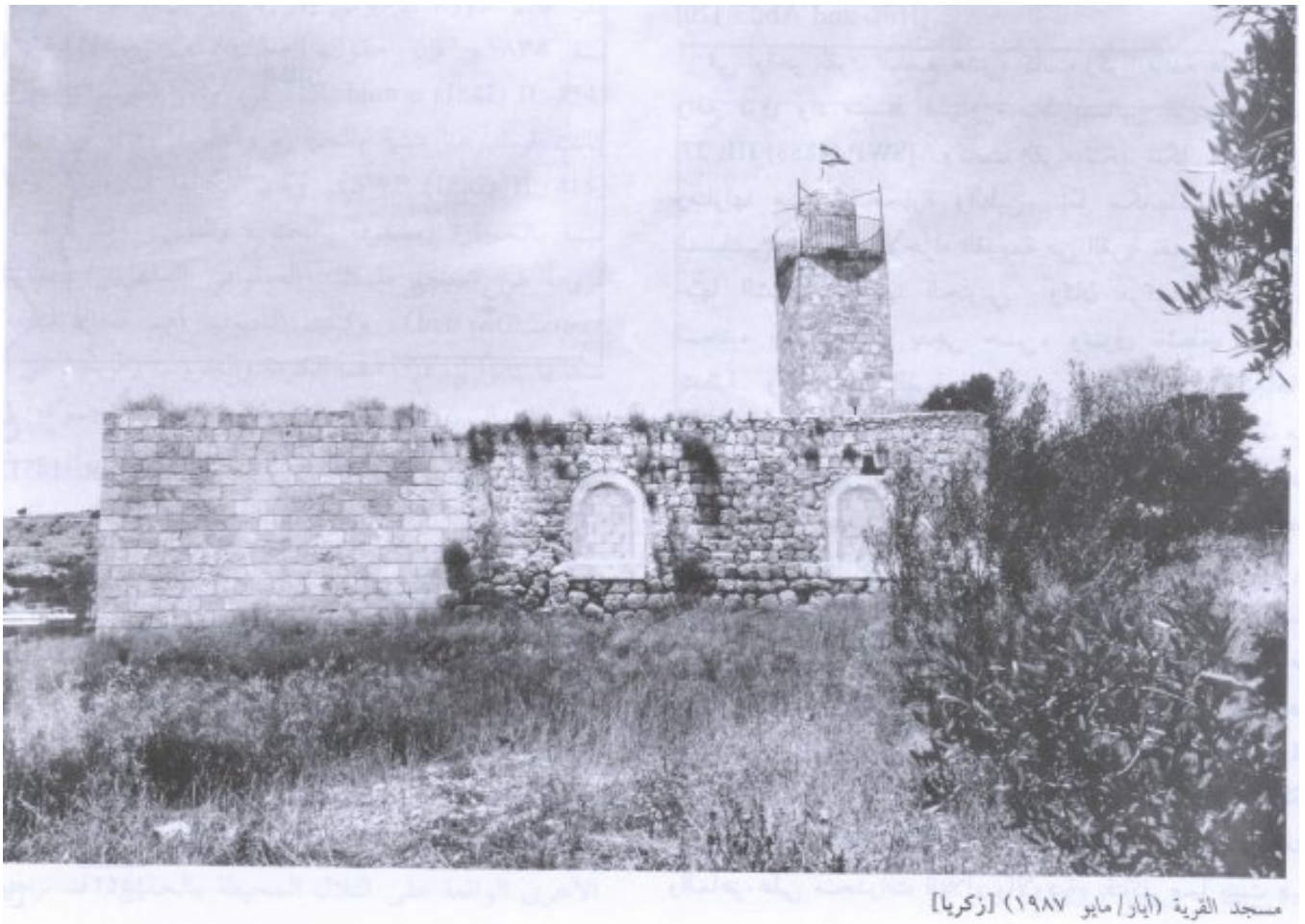


## Zakariyya



## Zakariyya: A Depopulated Palestinian Village in the Hebron District

Zakariyya was a depopulated Palestinian village in the Hebron District, located approximately 25 kilometers northwest of the city of Hebron in the western foothills of the Hebron Mountains, at an average elevation of about 275 meters above sea level.

The village was occupied on 23 October 1948 during the Nakba and the occupation of Palestine in 1948, in the context of Operations ha-Har and Yoav. Unlike many neighboring Palestinian villages, however, the inhabitants of Zakariyya were not displaced when the village was occupied. They remained there until 9 June 1950, when the village was emptied of its Palestinian inhabitants and most were transferred to Ramla. The settlement of Zekharya was established on village land in the same year.

## **Location of Zakariyya**

- Zakariyya was located approximately 25 kilometers northwest of Hebron.
- Its average elevation was about 275 meters above sea level.
- The village stood on undulating ground in the western foothills of the Hebron Mountains, underlain by soft white Eocene limestone.
- It stood beside the road linking Bayt Jibrin with the Jerusalem–Jaffa highway and was connected by secondary roads to Bethlehem, 'Ajjur, Dayr al-Dubban, Tall al-Safi, and other Palestinian villages.

## **Zakariyya Through History**

Walid Khalidi associates the village name with the continuity of settlement at the site during the Roman and Byzantine periods, when the locality was known as Caper Zacharia and fell within the administrative jurisdiction of Bayt Jibrin.

In 1596, Zakariyya was a village in the nahiya of Jerusalem within the liwa' of Jerusalem. Ottoman records cited by Khalidi give an estimated population of 259. The inhabitants paid taxes on wheat, barley, and olives, as well as goats and beehives.

## **The Built Environment of Zakariyya**

In the late nineteenth century, Zakariyya stood on a slope above a broad, flat

valley and was surrounded by extensive olive groves. The village had a rectangular layout, and its houses were constructed of stone and mud.

The older sections were concentrated in the center and in the northern and southern quarters. The village center contained a mosque, a shrine dedicated to Shaykh Hasan, a busy marketplace, and an elementary school. In later years, construction expanded in all directions, particularly north and south.

## Water Supply in Zakariyya

The inhabitants obtained most of their drinking water from two communal wells: al-Saflani well near Wadi 'Ajjur and al-Sarara well north of the village.

Household cisterns and wells were also used to collect rainwater and supplement the village water supply.

## Land Ownership in Zakariyya

The total land area recorded for Zakariyya in the 1944/1945 statistics was 15,320 dunums. The Arabic Palestine Remembered table uses the categories “Palestinian,” “Transferred to Zionists,” and “Masha'.” These terms are preserved below to reflect the terminology used by that source.

The Government of Palestine statistics, as reproduced by PalQuest, record 15,311 dunums as Arab-owned and 9 dunums as public land, with no Jewish-owned land recorded within the village lands.

## Land Use in Zakariyya in 1944/1945

A total of 7,484 dunums was cultivated or classified as cultivable land, including 6,523 dunums devoted to cereals and 961 dunums irrigated or used for plantations. Of the latter, 440 dunums were planted with olive trees.

Non-cultivable land totaled 7,766 dunums, consisting of 7,757 dunums of Arab land and 9 dunums of public land. The built-up area covered a further 70 dunums.

The 440 dunums planted with olive trees formed part of the 961 dunums classified as plantations and irrigable land and should not be added again as a separate land-use category.

## Economic Life in Zakariyya

Rainfed agriculture formed the backbone of the village economy. The principal crops included cereals, beans, fruit, and olives.

Animal husbandry and poultry raising were also important. Villagers grazed sheep and goats on the wild vegetation growing along the surrounding hillsides and wadis.

## Population of Zakariyya

Zakariyya had 682 inhabitants in the 1922 census and 742 in the 1931 census. The Government of Palestine's 1944/1945 statistics recorded 1,180 inhabitants, all of

them Arab Muslims.

Later estimates, rather than official censuses, are available for the population immediately before occupation and displacement. Palestinian researcher Salman Abu Sitta estimated the population at approximately 1,369, a figure sometimes rounded to about 1,370 in Palestinian sources.

A Palestinian study drawing on Abu Sitta's data estimated the number of people from Zakariyya in 1998 at approximately 8,406, including 8,334 registered with UNRWA.

The figures of 383 inhabitants in 1948 and 2,351 refugees in 1998 currently displayed in the Palestine Remembered statistical table appear inconsistent with the other documented figures for Zakariyya and have therefore not been adopted in this version.

Number of Houses in Zakariyya

The 1931 census recorded 189 houses in Zakariyya.

## Education and Village Landmarks

The village center included an elementary school, a mosque, the shrine of Shaykh Hasan, and a marketplace. Palestinian local accounts indicate that formal schooling developed during the British Mandate period after an earlier tradition of kuttab education.

The mosque was one of the principal religious and architectural landmarks of Zakariyya and remained standing after the displacement of the inhabitants.

## Archaeological Sites Around Zakariyya

Several archaeological sites were located near the village. Tall Zakariyya stood approximately one kilometer southwest of the village and rose about 117 meters above the plain.

The tell was excavated in 1898 and has been identified by some researchers with the ancient town of Azekah. The plain east of the village has also been associated with the Valley of Elah mentioned in the Biblical account of David and Goliath. These identifications are presented as archaeological and textual interpretations rather than as independently established historical events.

## The January 1948 Attack on Zakariyya

Zakariyya came under attack during an early stage of the Nakba in January 1948, in the course of fighting around the bloc of Jewish settlements known as Kfar Etzion, south of Bethlehem.

According to Walid Khalidi, citing a New York Times report based on Arab sources,

a Haganah force estimated at about one hundred men besieged Zakariyya together with Dayr Aban and Bayt Nattif. The action lasted approximately twenty-four hours, and the three villages came under fire on 17 and 18 January 1948.

This attack did not result in the permanent occupation of Zakariyya, which remained outside Israeli control until October.

## **Operations ha-Har and Yoav**

The occupation of Zakariyya took place during the simultaneous Israeli advances of Operations ha-Har and Yoav in southern Palestine in October 1948.

Operation ha-Har lasted from 19 to 24 October and was intended to widen the Israeli-held Jerusalem corridor and connect it with territory occupied in the Hebron hills. Operation Yoav began on 15 October and continued into early November, targeting Egyptian forces and large areas of southern Palestine.

PalQuest lists Zakariyya among the villages affected by Operation ha-Har, while Walid Khalidi describes its occupation as occurring near the end of both Operations ha-Har and Yoav, when their operational areas became contiguous.

## **The Occupation of Zakariyya on 23 October 1948**

Israeli forces occupied Zakariyya on 23 October 1948. Walid Khalidi considers it probable that the force that entered the village was the Fourth Battalion of the Giv'ati Brigade.

The capture of Zakariyya linked Israeli-held areas in the Hebron hills with the Jerusalem corridor.

Palestine Remembered contains an internal inconsistency regarding the unit involved: its statistical summary identifies the Fourth Battalion of the Golani Brigade, while the narrative reproduced from Khalidi identifies the Fourth Battalion of the Giv'ati Brigade. Because PalQuest and *All That Remains* support the Giv'ati attribution, that identification is used here.

# The Villagers Remained After Occupation and Were Displaced in 1950

Unlike many Palestinian communities occupied during Operations ha-Har and Yoav, the inhabitants of Zakariyya were not expelled when the village was occupied in October 1948. They remained in their homes under Israeli rule.

According to information cited by Walid Khalidi, plans to remove the inhabitants emerged by late 1949 but were not immediately implemented. A decision to evacuate the village was taken in January 1950.

On 9 June 1950, Zakariyya was emptied of its Palestinian inhabitants. The sources cited by Khalidi do not specify the precise method used. Most residents were transferred to Ramla, while some may have gone to Jordan.

It is therefore important to distinguish between the occupation of Zakariyya on 23 October 1948 and the final displacement of its inhabitants on 9 June 1950.

## Settlement Established on the Lands of Zakariyya

In 1950, the settlement of Zekharya was established on the lands of the Palestinian village, close to the original village site.

## **The Site of Zakariyya After the Nakba**

According to Walid Khalidi's field description, the mosque and a number of village houses remained standing. Some houses were deserted, while others were occupied by Jewish residents. Large areas of the site were covered with wild vegetation.

The mosque was described as being in a state of serious neglect, with vegetation growing over sections of its walls and roof and across the surrounding ground. Khalidi also recorded an Israeli flag placed on its minaret.

A more recent Palestinian heritage source reports that the mosque remains standing in poor condition and that barbed wire has been placed around it, restricting access.

Parts of the surrounding village lands continue to be cultivated. The survival of the mosque and several houses means that descriptions of Zakariyya as having been completely destroyed are inaccurate.
